


HOW TO CONNECT YOUR VIC

Welcome to computing! The following step-by-step instructions show you how to unpack the VIC, connect it to your television set and make sure it's working properly.

Let's begin by taking a quick look at the VIC 20:



1: Check the contents of your VIC container. You should find the following items:


- VIC 20 Personal Computer
- Power Supply (large box with 2 cords coming out of it)
- RF Modulator (small metal box) and cable
- Coaxial cable with plugs.

2: You will need 2 electrical outlets (sockets) — one for the VIC and one for your television set.

3: Position the VIC and Television set so you can use the keyboard comfortably while viewing the television screen . . . ideally, a tabletop or desk.

- 4:** Find the ON/OFF switch on the right hand side of the VIC. Make sure it's in the "OFF" position.


- 5:** There are two cords coming out of the power supply box. Plug the power supply cord into an electrical outlet and plug the other cord into the power cord socket on the side of the VIC. NOTE: The power supply remains "on" while plugged in so you should unplug it when not in use.



- 6:** Connect the video cable to the back of the VIC and to the RF Modulator box, as shown. Make sure to connect it to the video port and not to the 6-pin serial port, which is next to it.



- 7:** Connect the TV Modulator to your television set by means of the lead supplied — the phono plug fits into the modulator and the other end connects to the UHF socket on your television by means of a coaxial plug.



- 8:** Turn on the TV set. The RF modulator has a switch which allows selection of either Channel 0 or Channel 1. Select either channel on your TV set.

- 9:** Turn on the VIC (the red power light on the top of the computer should come on). If the power light does not glow, consult the accompanying chart.

- 10:** Tune the television until a sharp image is obtained. The fine tuning on your television may need some adjustment. Here is what you should see on the screen — sometimes it takes a second or two to activate. If you don't get the following display on your screen, turn the computer off, wait a few seconds and turn it on again.



- 11:** Adjusting the colour and tint/hue depends on the colour controls provided on your television set — naturally, sets with better controls yield better colour. Some sets show some colours better than others.

- 12:** If you have trouble with any of these steps, consult the accompanying troubleshooting chart.

NOW YOU ARE READY TO START USING THE VIC 20

NOTE: You can use a monitor instead of a television set — in which case you can go directly from the VIC to the monitor cable, without the RF Modulator.

TROUBLESHOOTING CHART

NO PICTURE (POWER LIGHT OFF)	VIC not "on"	Make sure power switch is in "on" position
	VIC not plugged in	Check power socket next to power switch
	Power supply not plugged in	Check connection with wall outlet
	Bad fuse in VIC	Take VIC to your Authorised Commodore Service Centre for replacement of fuse*
NO PICTURE (POWER LIGHT ON) (Try turning VIC off for a few seconds, then back on)		
	TV on wrong channel	Check Channel for picture
	Incorrect hookup	VIC hooks up to "UHF" socket on TV (the aerial socket)
	Modulator not plugged in	Check connection at 5-pin Video Port
	Video cable not connected	Check connection on modulator
PICTURE WITHOUT COLOUR	Poorly tuned TV	Retune TV
PICTURE WITH POOR COLOUR	Bad colour adjustment on TV (see "picture without colour")	Adjust colour/hue/brightness controls on TV
PICTURE WITH EXCESS BACKGROUND NOISE	TV volume up too high (see "picture without colour")	Adjust volume of TV
PICTURE OK, BUT NO SOUND	TV volume too low	Adjust volume of TV

WARRANTY

Commodore VIC 20 Personal Computer System and associated Commodore Computer Programs ("VIC")

- (a) Commodore warrants to the original purchaser (the "Purchaser") that the VIC sold to the Purchaser shall be free from defects in materials and workmanship for a period of 90 days from the date of purchase by the Purchaser. In the event that a defect covered by this warranty is discovered within this 90 day warranty period Commodore will, at its option, either repair or replace the VIC upon delivery of the defective VIC by the Purchaser to the Commodore dealer from whom the VIC was purchased. Any claim under this warranty must be made by the Purchaser to such dealer within the 90 day period. All transport charges incurred by either the Purchaser or Commodore in connection with a claim under this warranty shall be paid by the Purchaser.

The foregoing warranty (the "Warranty") does not apply in the following cases:-

- (i) defects, damage or malfunctions suffered by or existing in the VIC resulting from improper handling, accident or act of God, misuse or abuse of the VIC by any person other than Commodore, failure of electrical power or failure of air conditioning; or
 - (ii) defects, damage or malfunctions suffered by, or existing in the VIC and developing while in transit for repairs; or
 - (iii) where repairs or modifications of the VIC are attempted or carried out by any person not authorised by Commodore; or
 - (iv) any other defects damage or malfunctions not due to defects in materials or workmanship of the VIC.
- (b) Subject to (c) below all terms, conditions, representations, warranties and obligations regarding the VIC, whether express or implied other than those expressly provided herein are excluded. Commodore shall not, except as expressly provided herein, be liable for any form of damages whether direct, indirect, incidental, consequential or otherwise arising out of or in connection with this order, the supply of goods whether such damages result from negligence on the part of Commodore its servants or agents or otherwise howsoever.
- (c) Provisions of the Trade Practices Act 1974 and other statutes, rules or regulations for the time being in force in Australia may imply certain conditions or warranties or impose obligations on Commodore which conditions, warranties and obligations cannot, or cannot except to a limited extent, be excluded, restricted or modified by the exclusions contained in paragraph (a) above or elsewhere in this order.

Such exclusions shall apply to the extent but only to the extent permitted by any such statutes, rules or regulations. Further, if conditions or warranties are implied or obligations imposed on Commodore pursuant to such provisions and they cannot be and are not excluded then so far as lawfully permissible the liability of Commodore pursuant thereto shall be limited to one or more of the following as Commodore in its absolute discretion shall decide:

- (a) replacement of the equipment or part thereof, or the supply of equivalent equipment;
- (b) repair of the equipment or part thereof;
- (c) the payment of the cost of replacing the equipment or of acquiring equivalent equipment;
- (d) the payment of the cost of having the equipment repaired.

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
